

### WHAT INSPIRED YOU TO START THIS VENTURE?

Former teacher at Colegio Sister Johanna and my childhood tutor, Leyda Smith, was one of my sources of inspiration for starting this organization. Due to her personalized lessons growing up, I viewed education as an enjoyable experience. And as I came back from studying abroad, I realized the power of learning a second-language, specifically English. As Mrs. Leyda told me about the struggles of students at Colegio Sister Johanna to learn the language due to large class sizes, I developed a mission: making personalized tutoring accessible to transform educational journeys into meaningful experiences.
